- At St John's, a non-Christian with an interest in history started documenting the churchyard
 Vicar invited her to social event and Sue started to attend services. Now she is committed Christian
- During Heritage Weekend, one local church put up around the churchyard a series of six simple signs about church history. These attracted several hundred visitors to explore, and led a number of new attendees to Sunday services
- In another local parish, twenty members of a local history group conducted a project to document the history of several churches. They got involved with current church members and several have gone on to attend an Alpha course
